

COMING BACK

Popping through my burgeoning pop music awakening was one artist I certainly knew about - the so-called king of Rock 'n Roll is kind of tough to ignore but hadn't taken seriously as a modern artist of my generation. One knows next to nothing at 15. A profusely sweating and black leather-clad Elvis had just done his comeback TV special on NBC the year before, mounting an allout offensive to distance himself from the teeny-bopper, dime-adozen movies he'd been making since getting out of the U.S. Army. Suspicious Minds hit the #1 spot on the charts, and was soon followed by a very different tune for the 50s hip-swinger, In The Ghetto, written by Mac Davis.



Davis' original title was "The Vicious Circle" – accurate, yes, about poverty and guns in our cities (frustratingly, still relevant), but a bit too literal. In The Ghetto, given a soulful rendition by Elvis, made me think, "Hey, this guy's telling a serious story about our times. I'll listen further." And that was it. My close-and-personal time with The King had begun.



As is inevitable with an actor, eventually one impersonates one's idol. And out it came - at Purdue, at American Players Theatre, at Bing and The King fundraisers, at Green Lake for the Brookfield mayor's retirement party (thank you Marsha Kuligowski for the brilliant white jumpsuit), and finally at Next Act in our Crackdown Cabaret of 2014. The Cabaret indulged one of my deepest fantasies, to sing Bridge Over Troubled Water, a la Elvis, with back-up singers.

Shameless, but we needed an ending.

All this is to explain how ersatz-Elvis made it onto the cover of Next Act's 2022-23 season brochure. With my impending retirement from Next Act Artistic Director duties, we thought it'd be fun to take our own spin on the classic concert security riff, "Elvis has left the building."

"They're all true whether they happened or not," says Rafe in Bill Cain's THE LAST WHITE MAN. He's talking about theater stories, and there are a lot that get told on stage in Cain's play. Another character, Charlie, remarks "You people love your theater stories". The world premiere of THE LAST WHITE MAN took place in April and May of 2022 at Next Act, and I would argue as many theater stories were swapped off stage as on. I would often walk through the theatre during the pre-show fight call and hear Brian Gill or JJ Gatesman regaling castmates with tales of mishaps and adventures in other productions.

Along the way, however, THE LAST WHITE MAN provided its own entry into the illustrious tradition of theater stories. Here's one for you - and yes, it's completely true:

In early April, a week before the show began tech rehearsals, COVID-19 hit THE LAST WHITE MAN team, taking an actor and, two days later, our stage manager out of commission. These were the first positive cases in a cast or crew member at Next Act since the pandemic started. As has happened with many companies across Milwaukee, it was time to get creative.

Fortunately, close-to-local actor, artist and allaround good guy Neil Brookshire was up for a challenge. (You may recognize Neil from Milwaukee Chamber Theatre's 2021 production of THE THANKSGIVING PLAY or Peninsula Players' 2021 ROMANCE IN D. Keep an eye out for him in early 2023 on our stage in THERE IS A HAPPINESS THAT MORNING IS.) In less than a week, Neil completely stepped into the role of Rafe. He learned the blocking, set down the script and even confidently picked up a sword for several complex fights.



Let's pause to consider this for a second: in a play about an understudy replacing the actor playing Hamlet, we had an understudy replacing the actor playing the understudy replacing the actor playing Hamlet. Many folks pointed out the serendipitous humor of the situation - writing for the Journal Sentinel, Jim Higgins noted, "If Next Act had not announced it, no one would have guessed, as Brookshire fits in seamlessly."

Meanwhile, up in the booth, Deck Chief/COVID Safety Officer Natasha Goeller was learning the ropes as the show's Stage Manager. As Neil was working to step in as Rafe. Nat was figuring out how to make the show run smoothly, handling the timing of the lights and sound to pull off the show's technical elements. In a testament to their hard work, everything went off without a hitch.

...at least through opening night.

After a successful world premiere debut, the cast came back for their first two-show day, Saturday, April 15. Everyone took rapid antigen COVID tests - and we had another cast member test positive. We scrambled to call off shows for the day-the only two shows Next Act had to cancel in our entire 2021-22 season—and a PCR test confirmed the bad news: we had another positive case in the cast.



There was one person who, above anyone else, was familiar with the Charlie role - he had read the role during our staged reading of the play in December 2021, THE LAST WHITE MAN director and Next Act Producing Artistic Director David Cecsarini was the one to save the day this time, stepping into the role of Charlie with less than 24 hours notice. Script in hand, he went onstage on Sunday and we were able to complete our opening weekend.

If you're keeping score, by the second week of THE LAST WHITE MAN performances, Charlie, the famous movie star actor who mysteriously leaves the production of HAMLET, was being played by the This production started with four actors. It ended director of the play; Rafe, the ambitious understudy, was again being played by the original actor, but understudy Neil Brookshire was sticking around to do the swordfights for David's role; and our original stage manager was back and managing the show once more. Again, audiences had a field day; critic Anne Siegel stated David "did a magnificent job in replacing the missing actor."

Finally, in the third week of the production, all was restored. Ken Miller, IJ Gatesman, Brian J. Gill and Demetria Thomas appeared on stage as cast, with Jessica Connelly in the booth. For the final two weeks of performances, actors fought, quit productions and struggled with the question of whether "to be, or not to be" - but only within the confines of the play. THE LAST WHITE MAN successfully closed with no further issues.
