Tami Workentin returns to Next Act as the character Marty in CIRCLE

at Milwaukee Rep (among other projects!)
We sat down with Tami to see how she's

What excites you about CIRCLE MIRROR TRANSFORMATION?

getting ready for a busy year of theatre.

[Playwright Annie Baker] has a style to her. CIRCLE MIRROR TRANSFORMATION has pauses, and silences, and long pauses – you're given rules for how that applies. You have to log where silences or pauses are, and you also have to take the pearls with you – "what is your storytelling in that area?" We often sit in a circle, so who's going to see what? So, as an audience member, you may walk away with different takes on the individual stories.



What's also important is that it's not a movie. You've got to know what's going on in my head. There's got to be a tell theatrically.

What I love about this play is that everybody comes with a need. Marty comes with a

need because she's wanted to do this course for years. I can imagine her looking up her Viola Spolin games. Then, she's going to have an expectation for she thinks how it goes over, so she's going to have successes and disappointments along the way. But then you have these other characters walk in. only one of which really has any theatre experience, because it's in a community center

with adult actors. And adults stepping into an education setting is always scary because you wonder if you can still learn something, and you have no idea what's going to be asked of you. You have all these different people discover something about themselves. What I love is that they come in, and they change when they leave. It's going to be a lot of fun.

It's also a really smart, creative group of people. It's going to be something very different than what I've ever done in my career. It's not for the faint of heart. What will look very simple will have had a lot of talking and thought process going through it. It's truly an ensemble piece; I love that. It's Marty's play insomuch that she teaches the class, but it's a story about everybody.

I loved the premise of a woman teaching an adult drama class at a



community center: when you say that to me, my little brain goes, "how fun would that be!?"

And then you're back at Next Act next season playing Peg in SWING STATE. What drew you to that project?

What I love about it is that the title suggested something different than what the play turns out to be. I love the idea of this woman at a hinge moment in her life – that's when the best playwriting happens. She's really questioning what her lineage is going to be. She's lost her husband, she has no children, and their relationship to the land in the Driftless region is about keeping all of the native plants there. That's cool. The Driftless region is such an interesting area in Wisconsin. There are a lot of artists out there.

I love that she was an educator and



that she is looking to pass on [her knowledge] to this guy who hasn't found his landing yet. How that has become an important relationship to her. The young cop comes into the show and they realize that they'd been teacher and student. She has an adversarial relationship with the other cop because [that cop is part of] the farm family that's threatening [my character's] land. We're all feeling different things that way. I come from a family of farmers. It's fascinating.

I also love that this play takes off in another direction that you don't expect it to go. It will surprise you. It's fun. Rebecca Gilman's a great playwright, and she lives in the Driftless region, so how wonderful that this play would be done in Wisconsin.

doing both CIRCLE MIRROR You're TRANSFORMATION and SWING STATE with Elyse Edelman. Have you worked much with her otherwise?

We knew each other in passing. We kind of decided we needed to get to know one another, so I went to her house for cocktails and hula hooping. And I would like to say that I am the key to how she has conquered the hula hoop. I would like that in print.

Tell us about GEORGE & GRACIE: A LOVE STORY. How did that come to be?

I looked at Jim and I, and I thought, "we are like George [Burns] and Gracie [Allen]." I really felt like I wanted to write something for us. Certainly as you get older, those roles diminish, particularly for women. I watched other people take a hold of that. It's interesting, because when you're 63, you decide at a point whether to settle into what you know and let that be, or do you say to yourself, "why don't I try something that might scare me?" My idea in my head wasn't that I would fail, my idea in my head was that I would succeed.



I have a colleague named Wolfe Bowart from SpoonTree Productions. He is a physical comedian. And I reached out to him, and I said, "I have this idea." I've always wanted to find a way to work together.

GEORGE & GRACIE is about words. Wolfe's work is about not using words. [I wondered] how can these marry? He said, "if you had to do an elevator pitch, how would you do an elevator pitch to, say, a 7-year-old, a



Because the 7-year-old won't know who Gracie is, neither will the 20-year-old and maybe [not] a lot of 40-year-olds.

When you write about biographies, you can be stuck in the world of biography. And you're tethered too tightly to it, feeling as if you can only tell that story. You can't go off on "what-ifs." I thought, what if I write about the perspective of George going on stage the first time after Gracie died as a single performer? Now, historically, he went on to perform with other people while she was still alive. Doesn't matter. Now, I can make this shit up. Very little is written about Gracie's

inner monologue, what she thinks, outside of what George writes about her. So, I have to make some of that up.






This is an event on a night that doesn't ask a lot of you. It's sweet. It's funny.



REMEMBERING JONATHAN SMOOTS

Jonathan Smoots passed away Friday, March 21, following a brief battle with pancreatic cancer. Jonathan was a titan of the Milwaukee theatre scene remembered by audiences and colleagues alike for his enormous stage presence, passionate portrayals of some of the greatest characters in both the classical and contemporary stage canons, and fierce loyalty to, and love for, his friends. For more than 40 years, Milwaukee Rep, Milwaukee Chamber Theatre, Renaissance Theaterworks, Madison Rep. Next Act and Spring Green's American Players Theatre stages have all been graced by his enduring artistic talent.

In 1990, Jonathan was serving as Artistic Director of Milwaukee's Next Generation Theatre, originally founded by Jane Barclay Mandel, when it merged with Sharon McQueen's Theatre Tesseract to form Next Act Theatre. He served as Next Act's first Artistic Director, quiding the fledgling company for two years before handing over the role to Producing Artistic Director emeritus David Cecsarini, Ionathan continued to contribute substantially to Next Act's artistic programming, serving for three years as Artistic Associate, directing 10 of the company's productions and appearing in another 10. Some of his favorite productions at Next Act were his appearances in SEA MARKS, FAITH HEALER and EQUIVOCATION, as well as directing THE BOYS NEXT DOOR.

Current Next Act Theatre Artistic Director Cody Estle had this to say: "Next Act Theatre was founded 35 years ago by Jonathan Smoots and David Cecsarini, among others, and today, it continues to create exceptional plays for all of us to enjoy. With the passing of Jonathan, Next Act's first artistic director, we reflect on and deeply appreciate the work he and David put into building this company, allowing it to continue producing powerful theatre. I am mindful of the legacy left by those who came before me, and it is an honor to carry the baton they passed down. All of us at Next Act Theatre are keeping Laura Gordon, Jonathan's wife, and David Cecsarini, his best friend, in our thoughts during this time."

Ionathan met David Cecsarini in 1980 at American Players Theatre, and the two quickly became friends and frequent collaborators. David had the following to say:

"Ours was a friendship forged onstage as well as off,






informed as much by Star Trek as it was by Shakespeare. Jonathan's confidence and skill with classical language rubbed off on me and showed me the way forward. As we acted side-by-side in those early APT days, we realized that we shared common, core principles in how we liked to make theatre. Those shared tastes would lead to directing, and eventually to the forming of Next Act Theatre, and all that has come thereafter. We have worked together, learned together, groused together,

grown older together and supported one another through thick and thin these past 45 years. Jonathan was one-of-a-kind, to me and to so many others. His absence leaves a hole in our hearts. In the words of Marc Antony: "Here was a Caesar; when comes there such another?"

A memorial for Jonathan will be

held at Next Act Theatre on Monday, May 5, with refreshments and catered hors d'oeuvres from 6 to 7 p.m. and the memorial starting at 7 p.m. RSVPs to info@nextact. org are encouraged, but not required, by Monday, April 28. Jonathan's family suggests memorial donations to Next Act Theatre or End Of Life Choices. Oregon (EOLCOR).





LAYERS UPON LA THE MIXED MEDIA OF TERRY TAYLER





Artistic expression takes many forms. From abstract scratchings on paper to hyper realistic paintings and sculptures, we humans are creatively unrelenting! While I admire, appreciate and even envy the skill shown in very realistic depictions, I find myself drawn to more non-representational, expressive work for its openness to personal interpretation. I also appreciate the creative process of discovery that drives the making of such art. While the realistic painter has a clear vision of their completed piece, the abstract artist is guided by their process with a limited sense of the final result. And so it is with our featured artist Terry Tayler, and with the dramatic acting exercises portrayed in the play CIRCLE MIRROR TRANSFORMATION by Annie Baker. Both start within a proscribed structure, be it a rectangular canvas or a set of "rules", but the outcomes for both are unpredictable and often with dramatic personal revelations. I invite you to dive into Terry's layered compositions to find what he may reveal about himself and perhaps you.

Terrence Tayler is a mixed media artist born and raised in Wauconda, Illinois. He is now currently based out of Milwaukee, Wisconsin working on multiple different series in a variety of sizes and mediums. Tayler graduated from The Peck School of the Arts at UWM with a degree in Fine Art and Art History and Criticism.














A clever comedy from a Pulitzer Prize winner!
